This presentation will highlight the core competencies a medical director should continually develop to optimize the care patients receive and ensure regulatory compliance. As an equal member of the hospice interdisciplinary group, the medical director can learn from and teach other group members in hopes of continually improving patient care and outcomes while elevating the quality of the entire hospice organization.

11:20am – 12:20am | Documentation for Eligibility & Audit Readiness | Hunter Mercer, BSN, RN, Hospice in the Pines | Learners will be able to explain the key elements of the physician's eligibility statement. They will also be able to identify the essential components of strong documentation for both initial and comprehensive assessments across all disciplines. Additionally, learners will gain an understanding of how measurable care goals in the hospice plan of care are linked to QAPI (Quality Assurance and Performance Improvement) measures.

1:30pm – 2:30pm | Palliative Care & Symptom Management | Sean Seelbach MBA-HCM, BSN, RN, CHPN, Executive Director, Three Oaks Hospice | What is palliative care? This session will cover the core principles of palliative care and how it differs from hospice, offering clear guidance on when and how to integrate palliative services into clinical practice. Participants will learn how evidence-based tools are used for symptom assessment, explore strategies for managing complex symptoms such as pain, dyspnea, and nausea, and gain skills for navigating difficult conversations around goals of care and advance planning. The session will also highlight the psychosocial and spiritual dimensions of care, emphasizing support for both patients and their families.
